



MORE INFORMATION ABOUT KRAKOW

Kraków is a prominent academic and research hub in Poland, with a rich academic history dating back to the 14th century. As the former capital of Poland and one of the largest cities in the country, Kraków is located in the southern part of Poland, near the Tatra Mountains, making it an ideal place to live, work, or study. The city is home to 24 higher education institutions and nearly 100 research institutes, drawing students and researchers from around the world. In addition to its academic reputation, Kraków is also a center for various companies, institutions, and museums.

• TRANSPORT

Kraków offers a comprehensive and efficient public transportation system, making it easy to explore the city and its surroundings. While the city lacks an underground system, the integrated bus and tram network makes getting around simple and convenient. Many of the city's major attractions are within walking distance, which is often the best way to experience the charming streets and historic landmarks.

Public Transport:

- **Bus and Tram Network**: The buses and trams operate from early morning to late evening, with night buses and trams running less frequently. To navigate the system, you can check timetables and maps online at mpk.krakow.pl or use the navigation site krakow.jakdojade.pl, which is also available as a transport app.
- **Ticket Purchase**: Tickets can be bought from vending machines at major stops and on trams or buses themselves. It's worth noting that not all ticket machines accept bank cards, so having some change is a good idea. Cashless transactions can be done via mobile apps like SkyCash or MoBILET.

Tickets are valid for both trams and buses, and you can transfer between them within the allowed time. Remember to validate your ticket upon boarding to avoid fines.

Car Rental:

For those who wish to rent a car, you need to be at least 18 years old, have a valid foreign driver's license, and a credit card. Countries that have not ratified the Vienna Convention on Road Traffic (such as the U.S., China, and Australia) require an International Driver's License.

Taxis and Ride-Hailing:

- **Taxis**: Kraków taxis are reliable and affordable, with standard fares around 7 PLN plus 2.50 PLN per kilometer. Expect a 50% fare increase at night and on Sundays.
- Alternative Taxi Services:
 - Uber and Bolt are available in Kraków, with Uber also operating its European hub from the city. These services offer a cheaper, cashless option via their mobile apps, though be aware that Uber and Bolt drivers may not always have the same permissions as traditional taxis.

• BANKING

ACCES FOR THE DISABLED

Tours can be arranged using fully adapted vans that include standard seating and space for one wheelchair. For groups requiring additional wheelchair access, larger coaches are also available. Early booking is highly recommended.
